

## What to do in Case of Emergency?

If you have an emergency you have several options for getting help:

1. If you are on the road, ask your guide to contact emergency personnel.
2. If you are at the Rubin Site, let your guide know so that they can contact the staff in charge.
3. Always provide the following information:
  - Type of emergency
  - Your name and exact location of the emergency
  - If you require assistance (medical or other)
  - Number of injured persons (if more than 1)
4. In the event of an earthquake, evacuate to the safety zone calmly, wait for instructions from operations personnel or the Site Manager at the Rubin Site.
5. We have fire detection equipment as well as portable fire extinguishers, defibrillators, alarms, road-side emergency stations, etc.


All emergencies, incidents and accidents should be reported. Once the emergency situation is over, remind your guide so that together with the safety team, they can send the corresponding report.

departure to control puerta by  
radio on channel #1.**

**If you are a passenger,  
remind your guide to announce  
your arrival or departure  
from the site.**



## Safety Orientation Guide for Accessing AURA Facilities





## Observatories in Chile

The observatories located in the city of Vicuña, under the administration of AURA, correspond to: Cerro Tololo (MSO) at 2,300 masl (7,546 ft), and Cerro Pachón (GEMINI, SOAR and VERA C. RUBIN) at 2,650masl (8,694 ft approximately).

During the journey you should be alert to the effects of altitude on your body. If you notice any symptoms such as headache, difficulty breathing or nausea, you should immediately notify your tour guide or Safety Team.



## Before Entering the Site

You must consider:

The Observatory **is a construction site**, therefore, you must follow the instructions at all times.

Regarding clothing, wear long sleeves and sturdy long pants. **Shorts and short sleeve t-shirts are not allowed.**

If you have safety shoes, you **must wear them**. Otherwise, you must wear closed shoes according to the construction area.

In cold weather conditions, plan to wear appropriate clothing for those conditions.

You will be given basic safety instructions and information about the places that will be available during the visit.



## On Site

- Equip yourself with the Personal Protective Equipment that is provided upon arrival at the site. We will provide you with: Helmet and Reflective Vest. Use of both is **mandatory**.
- Respect the segregated areas. **Do not enter restricted areas** without prior authorization.
- **Never** separate from the group.
- Be careful and watch for vehicles (vans, trucks, cranes, man lifts, etc.)
- Avoid exposure to solar radiation. We are in an area where solar radiation is extreme, you should take precautions: use of sun block, dark sunglasses, good hydration, etc.
- Immediately report any unusual or concerning situation to the person in charge of your group.
